Key Questions: Why did women volunteer to support the war effort? Why did Mollie keep an autograph book during her time as a nurse?	
Starter Activity/ Introduction Why might women volunteer to help in the war effort? What sort of jobs might they do? What would happen when more and more men were called away to join the services? How would this affect women?	Resources Discussion
Why might someone keep an autograph book during the war? Main Activity Mollie Ross joined the Voluntary Auxiliary Detachment (VAD). This organisation was set up to enable women to play a part in the war effort. At first many went into nursing or helped provide comforts for soldiers. As the war progressed, more and more men were called up to fight and women were needed to take over their jobs. Explain how an autograph book is different from a diary. These are only three extracts from a much fuller autograph book that Mollie kept. Why might she have kept these? What are the different attitudes to war do the poems and the cartoons present. Why would they want to write down their thoughts and feelings? Using the internet, make your own collection of primary sources that you might include in an autograph book.
